

80 years have passed since the end of World War II – and how the world has moved on. Museums in all countries have preserved historical data and given an insight to following generations as to how each era leaves its footprint. A bold statement that the Coromandel Mining Museum can claim is that it has done its part in providing our community and visitors with the changes in our own backyard.

Mining and forestry have formed the basis of the town where we now love and live in, and our Museum attracts the attention of holidaymakers and overseas visitors who enjoy hearing our history.

As we know, the tourist industry is the mainstay of our survival in Coromandel Town and we encourage all visitors and tourists to visit us and enjoy the memorabilia of how we actually came to be here and how it came about.

Waitangi Day on **Thursday 6 February** is a celebration of the signing of a treaty to establish New Zealand as a nation and make it part of the British Empire. It was signed in 1840 by representatives of the British Crown and over 500 Maori chiefs and leaders. The Treaty guaranteed equal rights to all, Maori chieftains the ownership to their land, villages and cultural assets. The day is commemorated with such events as a powhiri, speech, kapa haka, flagstaffs and plaques at the Te Whare Runanga, the carved Maori meeting house in the Bay of Islands. The first Waitangi Day was celebrated in February 1934 and declared a public holiday in 1974 to resonate the gift of the Treaty. On **Thursday 6 February** we are offering a Free Day from 10am to 4pm to all visitors to the Museum. Do call in and enjoy our displays celebrating Waitangi and our own town history.

We are excited that our future expansion will include the Stamper Battery as part of a joint endeavour in the promotion of our town heritage.





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Beating the heat this summer

This summer is shaping up to be very hot, and with the world's inability to do enough to prevent climate change, there is every reason to believe that it is only going to get worse. There are many things that everyone can do to try to keep cool; no shortage of advice about keeping windows open, wearing cool white clothes, etc.

There is one very important thing to consider that really helps, and that is to paint roofs with paint that has the highest light and UV reflectance values. This makes more difference to the inside temperature of a building than is generally realised. To get a handle on this please do this little experiment. Next hot sunny day when you are in a carpark, try putting your hand on the roof of a number of different coloured cars. You will quickly find that the light, and particularly the white ones, are just a little warm to touch. But the dark ones will be so hot as to burn your hand.

Your house or shed, particularly the roof, will similarly absorb or reflect heat, according to the colour, and also whether the paint has a UV reflection agent in it. Modern house roofs have a layer of insulation underneath; this helps limit the amount of heat coming through, but by no means stops it. It also means that the cladding will get even hotter (less cooling effect on the underside) and that heat will cause the cladding to fail sooner than it would have if it was painted a lighter colour.

The usual response to the house getting hot inside is to turn on the air conditioning unit, which will use lots of electricity. The air conditioning unit will transfer some of the heat from inside the house to just outside of it. This heat has not actually "gone", just moved outside. Far better not to capture that heat in the first place. There is a lot of it.

On a nice, hot, sunny day, the sun's energy is about 1000 watts (or 1 kW) per square metre. So if you have, say, 150 square metres of roof (on your 140 sq metre house) it is subject to 150 kW of energy. (A typical electric heater puts out about 2.3 kW of heat.) The difference between your roof absorbing most of it or reflecting most of it is a lot of kilowatts. If it is reflected it is mostly "gone"; it goes back out into space. A little of it will be absorbed on the way by the increasing "greenhouse gases", which is what is causing climate change in the first place. But if it is absorbed by your roof, then that energy will be down there with you, making your house hotter, and all of the heat related problems worse. And this could be 100 kW (or 135 horse-power!) worth of unnecessary heat. For hours on end. It is known that the temperature in cities may be two or three degrees C hotter because of this. People who fly gliders find "thermals", being columns of hot air rising from built up areas, and they use these to gain altitude!

So I would ask: if you are building a new building of any sort, or repainting your roof, north or west facing walls, then please consider using at least UV reflective paint, and preferably a nice light colour. This will go a long way to keeping your house much cooler and more comfortable for you, it will save you a small fortune in power bills, and help your building to last longer. Wins all around. Remember that test you did on those cars.

And do consider putting some solar panels on the roof. Why not convert some of this energy to your own use? PV (photovoltaic) panels turn it into electricity, and hot water panels make lots of free hot water for you. You can even charge your electric vehicle with it; like having your own "free petrol" station on your roof!

Christmas is said to be the time of giving. Giving, or generosity, is also the first of the six paramitas or six causes for archiving bodhicitta. Bodhicitta is the attitude which puts the welfare of others before self. Generally, we may think of ourselves



as caring people who want others to be happy. But when we investigate our motivation deeply, mostly this ideal is stained by self-interest. We put the welfare of our family and those close to us ahead of those who are unknown to us. And for the ones we consider unfriendly or enemies, we even wish them harm. Even others who are on a different spiritual path are considered not worthy of our kindness to the extent where we wish harm upon them and start wars to eliminate them. In this way our wish for the welfare of others is stained by self-interest.

So when we are practicing the paramita of giving this Christmas it is an opportunity to delve a bit deeper into our own mind and check our motivation. If we find thoughts such as thinking, "I gave them such a wonderful gift and this is all they gave in return", then we are not practicing true generosity. It is stained with self-interest. In fact, if we are unable to practice the same generosity to a stranger in the street and our closest loved one, then the paramita of giving is stained with self-interest. It is not dependent upon the item which is given; it is the attitude of the giver at the time of giving. The only place this can truly be observed is in your own mind.



The Coromandel Community Preschool is a not-for-profit community-based centre providing education and care for up to 35 children. We have been operating within the community for 18 years. Our kaiako are all qualified and registered teachers with many years' experience. Our supervision adult to child ratios of 1:3 for up to 2's and 1:8 over 2's is better than Ministry of Education requirements.

The centre has a philosophy of learning through play and works within the Early Childhood Curriculum Te Whāriki. These guidelines have five strands and 20 different learning outcomes for our tamariki. The first two strands are Well-Being and Belonging. Looking at their corresponding learning outcomes, Te Whāriki states that, "Children experience an environment where, over time and with guidance and encouragement, children become increasingly capable of:

1. Well Being - Mana Atua

- Keeping themselves healthy and caring for themselves I te oranga nui.
- Managing themselves and expressing their feelings and needs | te whakahua whakairo.
- Keeping themselves and others safe from harm I te noho haumaru.

2. Belonging - Mana Whenua

- Making connections between people, places and things in their world I te waihanga hononga.
- Taking part in caring for this place I te manaaki i te taiao.
- Understanding how things work here and adapting to change I te mārama ki te āhua o ngā whakahaere me te mōhio ki te panoni.
- Showing respect for kaupapa, rules and the rights of others I te mahi whakaute."

Next month we will look at the other three strands: Contribution, Communication and Exploration.

Coromandel Area School

From all of us here at Coromandel Area School, we hope you are enjoying

the festive season and time with family. Whether you are locals and flat out working during the busy period, or whether you are visitors to our wee town, Coromandel is a beautiful place to be spending the summer and enjoying sand between your toes and lazy days on (or in) the water.

Summer in Coromandel can also bring rain. As I write this I'm crossing my fingers that the sun will shine and it will be sausages and BBQs day in and day out. In the case of a rainy day or two in tents, caravans, at home or in a bach, here are some tried and true, inside, device-free activities to try with the kids, using a pen and some paper, and maybe a pack of cards.

Dots and Boxes – start the game by drawing a grid of dots that's at least four dots wide by four dots tall. The bigger the grid, the longer the game will take to finish.

Players take turns drawing one horizontal or vertical line to connect any two adjacent dots on the grid. Eventually, enough line segments will be drawn to complete boxes between the dots. Whoever completes the fourth side of a box that connects four dots wins that box. The player writes their initials in the box to claim it and then takes another turn. The game ends when all of the dots are connected and there are no more lines to draw on the grid. The person with the most boxes wins.

Tic Tac Toe or Naughts and Crosses – draw a grid of three squares by three squares, each player picks a symbol to mark the squares on their turn. Usually an X and an O. Getting three in a row determines the winner.

Blind drawing – pick any object. It can be something visible to everyone or something people know about. Close your eyes and try to draw it without looking. Enjoy the laughs!

The tried and true card games, go fish, snap and last card. Or flip the cards over and play memory. If you want to get educational, take out picture cards and play memory

with numbers that add to 10, (ace and 9, 8 and 2, 7 and 3, 6 and 4, 5 and 5). Teachers will thank you for this one; these number bonds underpin a whole lot of mathematical thinking.

Mirror Mirror – to get a bit of movement going, sit (or stand) facing each other. One person starts moving slowly and the person facing them has to mirror their movements. You can make rules to create a winner, but really it's just fun being able to get someone else to move how you want them to.

Word within a word – pick a long word and everyone sees how many smaller words they can make using the letters of the longer word. See who can come up with the most words.

Put on a raincoat and go for a walk. See if you can find five knuckle bone (about the size of a coin) size pebbles. Ask someone born in or before the 1980s to help you out with what to do next!

Just a few ideas, and no doubt they will spark other games and memories. Have a lovely summer everyone.





Book review: Environmental Defenders: Fighting for our Natural World

Environmental Defenders was launched at a recent meeting of the Coromandel Forest and Bird Society by the author, Raewyn Peart. She is a director of the Environmental Defence Society (EDS) and has been awarded the NZ Order of Merit for her services to conservation. Her book also deserves an award, in my opinion.



From the deep south to the far north, from the Clyde Dam to the Karikari Peninsula, from the geothermal areas of Rotorua to the iconic coastlines of the Coromandel, EDS has worked to protect what's left of our natural world.

The depth and breadth of this chronology is truly impressive. EDS has worked for half a century to rein in coastal development, to enhance freshwater quality and biodiversity and to protect our precious natural and cultural landscapes.

How many of us know the stories of the legal battles to save parts of the Coromandel Peninsula that today underpin the tourist marketing slogan "Coromandel – good for your soul"?

For example, in 1971, a 1500-house subdivision was proposed for Waikawau Bay with an airfield, golf course, caravan park, a shopping area with bar, restaurant, gymnasium, pool, tennis courts and a boat marina. I hazard a guess that most surfing, fishing or swimming locals and DOC campers alike have little idea of that history and how the EDS helped save that beach, and other Coromandel coastlines.

In 1975 EDS worked again in partnership with the Physical Environment Association of Coromandel to help protect Matarangi. They argued the case to establish a coastal conservation zone in the District Scheme. As a result, the houses in the second stage of that coastal subdivision were then set well back from the coast. The initial houses built closer to the sea are now facing serious erosion and flooding risks.

EDS also supported Coromandel Watchdog in the 1980s in the grassroots campaign to protect the Coromandel Peninsula from multinational gold mining, resulting in legislation which protected the Peninsula – until now.

Besides supporting local communities, iwi and farmers in their environmental protection work, EDS has contributed to public education with its many publications and conferences over 50 years. This adds up to a phenomenal body of knowledge accumulated and shared: 13 community guides, 18 environmental policy conferences, 15 climate change and business conferences and 53 policy reports.

The tragedy is that our current government appears to view this legal and scientific expertise as a threat to its fast-track development agenda. Gary Taylor, CEO of EDS, has alerted us recently that the government has cancelled the Environmental Legal Assistance Fund "in an attempt to starve public interest litigants of resources". Gary warns us that "over the next 12 months, the government is embarking on the most comprehensive and detailed reform of environmental policy in our history... and there will be powerful and well-resourced vested interests seeking to lower environmental standards, causing more biodiversity loss and pollution."

Alarmingly, EDS has also just learned that the Ministry for the Environment has now been instructed by Minister Simmonds to not sponsor the EDS conference scheduled for 12-14 May. The Ministry for the Environment has been a founding sponsor of the EDS conferences which have brought together many groups – businesses, scientists, farmers, iwi and government officials – in a truly collaborative spirit to forge common understandings about protecting our environment.

Raewyn Peart's book, *Environmental Defenders*, is therefore very timely and an important book to delve into. If we don't know history, we will repeat its mistakes.

With its stunning landscape photography, it would make a superb Christmas gift too!

Forest & Bird

An unfortunate situation/all's well that ends well/not all dogs are created equal Being Forest & Bird, we sometimes get calls about wildlife in peril. In December, I had a call from a concerned local about a kawau (shag) behaving unusually, potentially unwell, on Oamaru Bay beach. Maintaining a distance from the bird but acknowleding that it was clearly, at very least, disorientated, we called the DOC Hotline (0800 362 468). Carolyn and I spent time with the bird. It was unafraid of us, possibly a juvenile



blown ashore, it was uncomfortable – constantly preening. And searching the sky with an open beak looking for its mother. We were able to sit quietly, very close by as he/she dozed and preened. The bird had been on the beach for at least a day when reported.

It wouldn't have stood a chance of survival had an untrained dog been in the vicinity.

A heron was part of the bird tribe this morning, keeping an eye on it all. Two

torea (oyster catchers) came to check on the patient. A tui flew straight across our line of vision, then a solitary seagull and as we began to count bird species, a swallow and some sparrows... Meantime the kawau dived into the sea just as Jamie the DOC ranger showed up and alerted us to a second breeding pair of torea at the northern end of Oamaru Bay. Not many people, but birds everwhere, doing their thing in their own environment.

Forest & Bird Upper Coromandel would ask that people refrain from driving vehicles onto beach areas and that all dogs are controlled on beaches this summer.

Driving Creek Conservation Park



If you are here for the summer and you're not sure what Driving Creek Conservation Park is... let me explain. The Driving Creek you probably know is where you can

go and experience the rail tour through native forest, the zipline flying through the native forest canopy and make some pottery using clay dug from the Coromandel hills. This tourist operation is a charitable trust and one way the profits are spent is on environmental conservation. In fact, a lot of the money goes towards paying our team of four conservation staff as well as contractors to keep this forest you ride or zip through healthy and thriving. The Conservation Park encompasses Driving Creek's own 24 Ha QEII covenanted property as well as an additional 320 Ha of surrounding private land and Public Conservation Land. Across this area we remove mammalian pests - like possums, rats and stoats, as well as getting rid of damaging environmental weeds. This has resulted in the return of Coromandel brown kiwi to our property, and we

now have a thriving array of birds and other native species right by Coromandel Town.

So, if you ride the train, take a pottery class, or do the zipline this summer, remember to enjoy the beautiful native forest at Driving Creek. Listen for the native birds, take a walk along our Nature Trail to learn about native species, check out the native geckos in the fenced wildlife sanctuary, and investigate the old mine tunnel to see cave wētā and glow-worms.

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




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
